Length of Internship: 2.5 days per week for 12 weeks. The assignment will be administered through the University of Cambridge's Temporary Employment Service and the position will be based at the Museum of Classical Archaeology.

About the Museum of Classical Archaeology (MoCA)

The Museum of Classical Archaeology is dedicated to the study and teaching of the classical past through the material and visual cultures of ancient Greece and Rome. Our collections are rather unusual, however. We don't only hold objects from 2,000 or so years ago – we also hold objects produced in the 19th century to replicate ancient artefacts which were housed somewhere else in the world.

Our Cast Gallery is home to one of the finest collections of plaster casts of Greek and Roman sculpture anywhere in the world – and our Museum has as many stories to tell about the practice of classical archaeology and the history of collecting the ancient past as it does about the history of classical art and the lives of ancient Greeks and Romans.

Project background

The Museum of Classical Archaeology is home to 15,000+ objects - ranging from plaster casts of classical sculpture, to small pieces of broken pottery (sherds). MoCA is developing a new catalogue enabling us to improve the information we hold on our objects. We have also recently undertaken an inventory of our 10,000 sherds, and as a result we have additional data which needs to be integrated into the catalogue records. This role is focused on improving the information in the new catalogue and on using that content to create digital engagement resources

Purpose of the internship

The intern will help us to clean and transfer the data we hold on our sherds, and also add to that information through research. Using this content, they will research and design an online tour or trail based around some of the objects they have been working with. In addition, most of MoCA's small team help to staff the front desk and engage directly with visitors, and therefore there would also be an opportunity to develop public-facing visitor services skills.

Training, support and learning outcomes

Training for the project will be delivered by the Curator with other members of the team as appropriate. The role will enable the successful candidate to gain knowledge in collections management including developing skills such as object handling, Spectrum standards of Collections care and data management systems. In addition, the successful individual will gain invaluable experience of creating digital resources that will assist with engagement and accessibility. Mentoring will be provided by the Collections Manager at the University Museum of Zoology and the Opening Doors Project Coordinator for the University of Cambridge Museums.

MoCA has Covid-safe procedures in place to protect staff, visitors and volunteers, in line with University of Cambridge policy, and access to additional rooms where needed for safe working.
